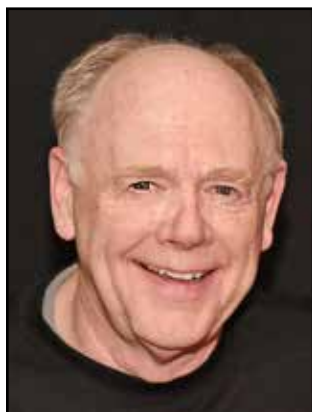

Dare to Matter

I want to remind Lions how important it is to focus on the pursuit of meaning instead of the pursuit of happiness. I would like to share a story that, for many years now, has continued to remind me of the difference Lions make in the community. It comes from an experience I had at the Lions Eye Bank.

On a stormy winter evening the staff of the Lions Eye Bank put a Styrofoam container carrying a donor cornea on a plane scheduled to arrive in Yakima later that night. We had been alerted to the need for a cornea for an emergency transplant that was scheduled to take place the next morning. We had tissue available and felt good that it would be in Yakima in time for the surgery.

Soon after delivering the cornea to SeaTac, the eye bank staff was notified that the flight had been cancelled due to weather. The only other option to get the corneal tissue to Yakima would be on a bus. The only problem was that the bus was actually headed for Spokane and was only going to stop in Yakima for a few minutes at 1:00 AM when the bus station was closed. In order to have the cornea be taken off the bus we needed to have someone at the station to meet the bus when it arrived.

My only hope of having someone at the bus depot at 1:00 AM was to call Lions Club members who had volunteered to transport tissue for the eye bank. The first gentleman I called was not happy to receive my call. It was quite late, he had been in bed and was asleep. He informed me he wasn't going to help us in this situation. When he asked what I was going to do now, I explained I would just keep going down my list until I found someone who would help. The Lion decided that since he was already awake and up he would help this one time. He made it clear he "never wanted to be called again."

In getting ready to leave his house he woke his 12-year-old son. The dad invited the son to go with him. They met the bus at the appointed time and the son held the precious cargo while they drove to the hospital. The dad delivered the cornea through the emergency room and got back into the car to return home.

On the way home the son asked his dad what exactly they had done. The son had held a box with a bright orange sticker that alerted people to its contents: "HUMAN EYE TISSUE." The dad explained that someone in Seattle had died and donated their eyes and there was a person in Yakima who needed part of that donor eye to save their sight.

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A Lifetime of Service Begins at a Young Age

As far back as I can remember I was serving. As the eldest child, I was always held responsible for the actions of my siblings as well as my own and early on, I was responsible for the household chores.

In parochial school, I became involved in many religious activities, becoming the head altar boy by the seventh grade. I was a Cub Scout, a Webelo's Scout and later a Boy Scout. During my scouting years, I participated in many church and community service projects helping people, groups and organizations. Placed in charge of certain aspects of projects, I learned leadership skills at an early age. Not every project in which I was involved was successful, but all were rewarding and taught me lessons on organization, delegation and responsibility.

While in high school I joined the Civil Air Patrol becoming involved in Land Search and Rescue, where I developed skills around group leadership, personnel evaluation and delegation. We trained in search and rescue techniques, procedures and protocols. During this time I also learned to help maintain single engine aircraft used for search and rescue of downed airplanes.

After high school I joined the United States Navy. My father had served in the U.S. Army Air Force as a RADAR operator; an uncle served with the Big Red One as a signal man, and another uncle served with Patton's third armored division as a tank driver. All three served during WWII; my uncles in Europe and my father in the South Pacific. Service certainly runs in my family. During the Vietnam War, I contracted both viral and bacterial pneumonia and spent six months at Balboa Naval Hospital in San Diego, before receiving a medical discharge.

Later I enrolled in college and eventually obtained my degree in education. I taught science in Coeur d'Alene Idaho for 31 years and followed that by heading the neighboring school districts after school program for two years. My passion for serving my students was so strong my wife decided to become a teacher as well. During these years, I became president of the local teacher's union, chief negotiator and advocate for the Coeur d'Alene Education Association. I further served on the Board of Directors for the Idaho Education Association for 12 years, representing all of North Idaho. I served on the Professional Standards Commission for six years and was the chair for two years, representing every educator in the State of Idaho. I represented all the educators of Idaho at the National Education Association's annual convention for ten years. During this time I received my Masters in Educational Administration.

Closer to home, I became involved with the Ducks Unlimited program and was co-chair of the Post Falls-Prairie chapter for 10 years. I was a member of the Post Falls Community Volunteers for several years as well. Certainly, high on my list of service contributions was my continuing involvement with the Post Falls Lions Club. I served as volunteer, worker, committee chairperson, secretary (twice) president, and treasurer three times. I also served as zone chairperson and as 2nd and 1st Vice District Governor.

I have been the main Santa Claus in Coeur d'Alene for the last nine years, working every day from Thanksgiving through Christmas. Over the last five seasons, I have allowed myself to be auctioned off for a charity. I delivered food, presents, and good will to several families on Christmas morning. AND NOW FOR SOMETHING COMPLETELY DIFFERENT: The 3 Minute Video Film Festival

"If you truly want to connect with your target audience, you need to share yourself with them on a regular basis. While you could publish a blog post or share photos on social media, there is nothing more personal than video. Video content allows your customers to see inside your operation, get a feel for your personality and feel like they are in the moment with you."

What the good folks at Forbes are saying is that videos are a great way to make meaningful connections with our lions members and potential members. I know this works because, as my club's Leadership Chair, I make sure that at EVERY MEETING we show an informational video provided online from the Lions International website www.lionsclubs.org. In under five minutes, our club members can see and learn about things that are going on in the greater world of Lions. And I created a one-minute recruiting video for use at our most recent Open House, see it below.

So how can we make video a powerful recruiting and marketing tool to reach new members and promote our Lions clubs? Simply this: create new Lions promotional videos for your club, district, multiple district or foundation that reach out to inform and inspire current and potential members.

And who shall create these magical videos, you may ask. Well, just about anybody with a modicum of computer skill has the tools available. Apple iMovie for Mac users and Adobe Premier Elements for Windows and Mac users are a good starting place. Other suggestions: Hitfilm Express and VideoPad.

Wouldn't it be a good idea to harness the computer skills of your younger members and ask them to get involved in promoting your club via video? The learning curve on this may seem difficult if you are new to video making, but many younger users are fluent in these already. If necessary, ask at the local high school or community college. Recruit some help, (and then make them a member!)



So, with the power of video out there to be used to promote your club, I'm proposing that we get started creating videos and then share them and inspire one another at our next Multiple District Convention in Wenatchee next October 17-20, 2019.

Here are the simple rules for creating a "3-Minute Video" to promote your club, district, multiple district or foundation.

- Videos can be 3 minutes max
- Videos must be uploaded to YouTube
- We'll have a FILM FESTIVAL in Wenatchee to share!

path of destruction 300 yards wide and 1.4 miles long. It was only the second tornado reported in Washington in the past 34 years.

District Governor Sharon Sikes, working with the dedicated Port Orchard Lions, contacted Lions Clubs International Foundation and requested an emergency disaster grant. Within 48 hours an emergency grant of \$10,000 was received. Before the grant was received, the club had mobilized its food trailer and put volunteers in action with the goal of feeding 500 people during the clean-up efforts.
